



Private Cornelius Spoor – 1864-1865

#### First Float Bridge

As for Spoor's bridge, Parsons says the first one was just a float bridge, which was tied up by a big rope and could be untied and allowed to float down the river when a boat wanted to get through. When horses were driven unwillingly onto the bridge it sank well down into the water with the weight of the load they pulled. Once the whole bridge broke loose with a team on it.

He does not remember what year the Milwaukee Bridge and Iron Works built the wrought iron bridge that "would not rust out," but he does recall that it was too narrow for any two vehicles to pass except himself and Dr. DeVoe. The doctor always laughed and kept right on going across when he met Parsons and said he never dared chance it with anyone else. Even then, their rigs would scrape the sides of the structure.


#### Concrete Bridge

Ben Grota says the present concrete bridge was built in 1950 with a combination of city, county and federal aids. Berlin's share of the \$112,000 cost was \$11,000. Federal aid came through because the river was under jurisdiction of the war department.

During the business of getting the new bridge built, Grota looked up the date of the old bridge — 1874. This was a center-suspended bridge which had a "key" mechanism for swinging on a center pivot to allow river traffic to pass. Spoor's bridges have always been in the small portion of the city, which lies in Waushara county. Berlin's northern boundary is the center of the river — a fact which brings the city into sharing the cost of any bridge built there.

(Transcriber's note: This was done because of the cranberry industry. The city of Berlin annexed that section so that it WOULD be in the city limits. The city was the only entity that could apply for state and federal funds and the cranberry industry was so important to Berlin – moneywise and jobwise).

Now the biggest hazard on Spoor's bridge is said to be the fisherman who operate from the bridge which has no provision for pedestrians. Their fish poles stick out into the roadway and "someday"......says Grota ominously.

He is a son of Joseph and Margaret VanWORNIER, who were natives of Albany, and whose ancestors were among the earliest settlers in the Mohawk Valley. Mr. SPOOR was educated and lived in the State of New York until 1852, when he came West, locating upon the farm where he now lives, one mile north of Berlin, at Spoor\*s Bridge, which he was influential in having built. He has been Chairman of the Board, and Supervisor. He was married 01 Nov 1848 to Miss Delia HUNTSINGER, a native of New York. They have five children. The oldest son, Courtland, is now principal of the school at Brandon. Mr. SPOOR enlisted during the late war, but was rejected; but was afterward drafted, and fought in front of Petersburg, Virginia, during the closing scenes, having his clothing several times pierced with bullets, and his gun shattered while in his hands. "Parsons says that Dad Spoor (Cornelius Spoor) was well remembered for the time he and Frank Clark, who lived across the road from him, got their heads together. The year the Berlin quarry opened up they hauled quarry rock for the road bed and surfaced it with gravel. The gravel wore off, but the quarry rock didn't and "people went bumpity, bump for years over that hard rock."



# Spoor Family Lent Name to Several Berlin Sites

"Casey" Spoor, "Dad" Spoor – those were the only first names Seth Parsons remembers for his former next-door neighbor. But the Spoor family name lives on in Spoor's Bridge over the Fox River on County Trunk XX north of the city, in Spoor School just north of the bridge and in Newcomb Spoor Park at Silver Lake.

However, immediate members of the family in the area have dwindled to a very few. Best known of these is Mrs. Harold Hanson who comes here in summer from her cottage at Silver Lake and spends her winters in Florida. She was the daughter of "Dad" Spoor's girl Emma who married Frank Whiting, Berlin hotel man.

#### Old Farmhouse

"Dad" Spoor's son, Herbert, also known in Berlin as "Dad" Spoor, died at Brown-Wilcox Home in 1949. He was popular for his annual portrayal of Santa Claus and for his work in Red Cross. Another son, Newcomb, lived and died on the home farm. Another son, Kirk, used to live near the Berlin fairgrounds and worked in the former Nels Johnson machine shop. Spoor's two daughters were Emma and Mattie.

Parsons often wonders why Spoor School was so named when it was located on the northwest corner of the old Parsons farm next door to the Spoor place. He says he believes the name was given because the Spoors were early settlers there.

It was Seth Parson's father who suggested rerouting the road so pupils would not have so far to walk to school. He gave two rods of land and Van Houten gave two rods to make the new road possible.

Parsons also remembers the days when he attended Spoor School, where the girls and boys were seated on opposite sides of the room. Even the playground was similarly divided and men and women were segregated for services at the old Welch church in the neighborhood.

Teachers recalled by Parsons are Anna O'Connor, Luvina Kennedy, Emma Higgs, his cousin, Fred Parsons, and Newcomb Spoor. Joseph Thomas and Parson's father were teachers there before Seth attended. Jennie Dollar also taught there and later in the Berlin Grammar School. The little school was closed about five years ago and 15 pupils were sent to Berlin city schools.

Memories still come to Parsons of the way the boys used to climb above the woodshed and get out of reach of the teacher. He also well remembers the spanking they got when she did lay her hands on them "till she couldn't raise her arm anymore."

Mingled with these incidents are the good times he had at recess and noon hour and the fact that he never had to stay after school. One fellow student told him later the teacher had heard some complaints that he was being favored. The teacher countered with, "When Seth has 50 words to spell, he spells 50 right. If you do the same you won't stay after either."

"Old Man Spoor didn't do much talking," said Parsons, "but his son, Newt, was a politician, smart in every way, and he made lots of political speeches, Sherman Potter and his father, both lawyers of Green Lake, used to come over to hear Spoor practice the speeches he planned to make as state Assemblyman. They offered criticism if they could find any. Quite often they couldn't find much wrong." He was one of the first cottagers on Silver Lake – Newcomb Spoor Park – being named for him.

### Saved the Frogs

Ben Grota of Berlin recalls that Newt Spoor was the man who "saved the frogs" by putting through legislation to prevent spearing except in season.

Parsons says that Dad Spoor was well remembered for the time he and Frank Clark, who lived across the road from him, got their heads together. The year the Berlin quarry opened up they hauled quarry rock for the road bed and surfaced it with gravel. The gravel wore off, but the quarry rock didn't and "people went bumpity, bump for years over that hard rock."

When Dad Spoor's wife contracted malaria fever, Mrs. Parsons, Seth's mother, went over to nurse her along with Mrs. Spoor's sister. (Mrs. Spoor was the daughter of Capt. David Mapes, founder of Ripon.) (JDM Correction – This would be Emeline (Huntsinger) Wilson – Mapes, wife of Capt. David Mapes) Both Mrs. Parsons and Mrs. Spoor's sister came down with the disease later. Mrs. Thomas from across the road, who had stopped there for a few minutes, also contracted it. Mrs. Parsons rose from her own sick bed and went over to care for Mrs. Thomas. Both got well, explained Parsons.

Seth remembers his mother telling of nursing a family of children through the black diphtheria – "the worst she had ever saw."

As the aging Dad Spoor became ill, Newt Spoor moved in and took care of his father. Parsons assisted in hauling milk and doing chores. Seth has stirred tales to tell of being cornered and fighting off angry bulls by spitting tobacco juice in their eyes or using a club to make them close their eyes and then grabbing them by the tail and whaling them till they gave in.

#### First Float Bridge

As for Spoor's bridge, Parsons says the first one was just a float bridge which was tied up by a big rope and could be untied and allowed to float down the river when a boat wanted to get through. When horses were driven unwillingly onto the bridge it sank well down into the water with the weight of the load they pulled. Once the whole bridge broke loose with a team on it.

He does not remember what year the Milwaukee Bridge and Iron Works built the wrought iron bridge that "would not rust out," but he does recall that it was too narrow for any two vehicles to pass except himself and Dr. DeVoe. The doctor always laughed and kept right on going across when he met Parsons and said he never dared chance it with anyone else. Even then, their rigs would scrape the sides of the structure.

### Concrete Bridge

Ben Grota says the present concrete bridge was built in 1950 with a combination of city, county and federal aids. Berlin's share of the \$112,000 cost was \$11,000. Federal aid came through because the river was under jurisdiction of the war department.

During the business of getting the new bridge built, Grota looked up the date of the old bridge — 1874. This was a center-suspended bridge which had a "key" mechanism for swinging on a center pivot to allow river traffic to pass. Spoor's bridges have always been in the small portion of the city which lies in Waushara county. Berlin's northern boundary is the center of the river — a fact which brings the city into sharing the cost of any bridge built there.

(Transcriber's note: This was done because of the cranberry industry. The city of Berlin annexed that section so that it WOULD be in the city limits. The city was the only entity that could apply for state and federal funds and the cranberry industry was so important to Berlin – moneywise and jobwise).

Now the biggest hazard on Spoor's bridge is said to be the fisherman who operate from the bridge which has no provision for pedestrians. Their fish poles stick out into the roadway and "someday"......says Grota ominously.
